#### **GLORIA'S STORY**




Women in Kasese district still pay the price for the increasing household poverty in the region. These women have continuously failed to attain basic support from their spouses increasing their vulnerability at different stages of the society. The increasing poverty has influenced the increase in commercialized sex for both young and old women to increase their abilities in supporting themselves. Some widowed women have lost hope and struggle to attain a single meal in a day they do not own land and even those who are married with access to land with permission from their male spouses are facing harsh climatic conditions like floods and heavy drought that hit their gardens hard minimizing their abilities to support themselves and their children that is zero abilities towards paying education and medical bills.

"The intervention of Anasi Farmers with its craft making project has transformed my life since it has enabled me to earn my own income and not depend on my husband as it has always been hectic getting support from him. The incorporation of financial literacy in their trainings has increased my knowledge and understanding on managing my little income and even saving it to be used in future but also be invested in my small street business I am yet to begin. I have now been able to grow nutritious foods in my backyard at home but also get time to concentrate on my craft..." Gloria narrates

Gloria today earns at least \$5 from the sale of each earring with ability to sell more than 10 pairs every month which has built her confidence and financial independence supporting the education, medical care and welfare of herself and her children. She also has ability to feed on two meals a day with her extra time spent on her backyard garden ensuring food is available for herself and her children. The craft making initiative has reduced idleness and increased innovation and creativity during her time at work. She believes that being an artisan has transformed her life and will be able to have even a better standards of living if she continues to produce and sell more art pieces.
