## CORE PROGRAMS

### AGROECOLOGY



We use a permaculture approach to ensure that soils, people and animals are all healthy and protected. through this we use indigenous knowledge and other organic skills to provide sustainable wellbeing for all living organisms. This has resulted into transformation of food systems, reduced environmental degradation in rural communities and conserved biodiversity.

### FOOD AND NUTRITION



We have focused our efforts on increasing access to healthy and safe food and increasing information on best feeding and dietary practices especially in rural households. This has enabled us to reduce malnutrition cases and other food related diseases especially among children and women. Food wastage, spoilage and scarcity are all being managed through the different interventions.

## 2025 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS



Our permaculture demonstration site with support from Earth Allies Restoration continues to develop as a centre for training, agricultural innovations and inspiration to small holder farmers.



At Anasi, we know that food insecurity is linked to and exacerbated by gender-based violence. That is why we integrate sensitization trainings to reduce GBV into our agriculture work. In the photo is 35 households that participated in anti-GBV trainings with support from the Haella Foundation.



With support from the Luena Foundation, we helped 35 households affected by severe flooding in Kyarumba to rebuild their farms in more resilient and productive ways. On the left, women farmers interact with soil during the making of a nursery bed, and on the right, a farmer inspected her micro-garden.



Our Agroecology Student Camp, supported by Cycle Sustain, attracted over 50 learned from 5 different schools! The camp included practical sessions on making ash pesticides (left) and a micro garden (right). All 5 schools have established diverse, nutritious gardens that both improve student diets and serve as hands-on learning centers for permaculture.



Our team participated in a capacity building training on communication and story telling organized by Foundation for community Development and Empowerment(FCDE) and Confluence Institute that would increase impact reporting and resource mobilization In Masaka.



Economic empowerment project through beaded jewelry and bag making support from American Women for International Understanding (AWIU) benefited 35 women in Kisinga Sub country, increasing their financial independence.

## SUCCESS STORY



Many young women in our community have been frustrated by low and no employment hence struggling to make ends meet. This has increased early marriages with high dependence on their male spouses. Nearly 6/10 young women married are battling domestic violence a cause for our intervention on increasing their skills through making beaded bags and jewelry to increase their financial independence.


**“I lacked skills that would earn me income to enable me support myself and my siblings, Anasi Farmers later recruited me under their skills program this has enabled me to make highly marketable hand crafts like necklaces, earrings and beaded bags. Today I can afford to earn atleast \$3 dollars from each of the bracelets i make daily. My focus now is on increasing market for the products i make both locally in my community and other wider country and entire globe...”**

Lillian has increasingly gained experience in making jewelry and beaded bags through our training centre. She is today our lead trainer, passing skills to other young women trainees recruited by our team from the community. This project, funded by American Women for International Understanding as well as Village Lift to build international market, has enabled Anasi Farmers to continue training more young women, increasing their financial freedom and changing their lives.
